Best Practice - I

1. **Title of the practice:** **Compilation of Paper Clippings**
2. **Context:** Newspapers reflect the burning social issues related to numerous issues ranging from domestic violence to foetus infanticide. The subject sociology primarily aims to explore such serious issues. However the textbooks and prescribed syllabi deal with theoretical assumptions. So it's necessary to make students aware of the existing issues in the real life.
3. **Objectives:**
 - i) To make students aware of the contemporary social issues.
 - ii) To motivate students to read newspapers.
 - iii) To study the sociological concepts from the practical point of view.
4. **The practice:** This activity was conducted by the department of Sociology. The students who have opted Sociology in B.A. Part I and II were asked to bring the articles from newspapers reflecting different social issues. They were asked to collect such news which are directly related to the syllabus. In the classroom, such news were discussed. Students were motivated to express themselves. The news clippings were submitted to the department.
5. **Evidence of success:** It has been observed that students understood the social concepts and their application in day-today life in a better way.
6. **Problem encountered:** Being located in a rural area, there is limitation to collect the cuttings from various newspapers. The availability of newspapers is limited.

Best Practice - II

1. **Title of the practice:** Newspaper Reading Activity
2. **The context:** It has been observed that students seldom read the Hindi newspapers. So they do not have adequate Hindi vocabulary. Similarly, their Hindi pronunciations are marred by the influence of the mother tongue. Therefore, it becomes necessary to give exposure to the students in that direction.
3. **Objectives:**
 - To enhance students' Hindi vocabulary.
 - To make students aware about the use of formal language.
 - To make students aware about proper pronunciations.
4. **The practice:** The department of Hindi conducted this activity. The activity was conducted for the B.A. Part III students who have opted for Special Hindi. The concerned teacher would take the copies of 'Hindi Samachar Patra' and 'Navbharat Times' to the class on every Monday. The fourth lecture from the timetable was reserved for this activity. The activity started in the month of September 2015 and lasted up to February 2016. The students were asked to select certain news. Specific time was allotted to them for practice. After that they were asked to read the news loudly. The concerned teachers motivated them to read the news with proper pronunciation and accent.
5. **Evidence of success:** Students understood the difference between formal and informal language in a better way. Similarly they understood the topic of Application of Language which is prescribed for their syllabus.
